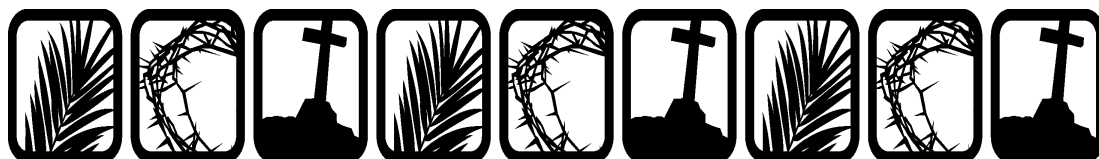

From the Pastor's Desk

What is Lent?

The following article was prepared by an ELCA Pastor, Rev. Thomas Weitzel in a Lenten Handbook that he prepared for his congregation. It is a helpful article to remind us of what Lent is all about.

The season of Lent derives from the ancient Church's period of preparation for those who were to be baptized at the Easter Vigil. That preparation included instruction, fasting, repentance, prayers and special acts of devotion. Today, the entire Church uses this same period and some of those same practices to prepare for the Feast of the Resurrection of Christ.

The word "Lent" comes from the old English word "lencten" (meaning lengthen), and is a reference to the lengthening of days that occurs during this time of the year. For that reason, Lent is associated with Spring. As the earth sees a rebirth and renewal of the plants and flowers during this season, so Lent is a time for Christians to consider our rebirth in Baptism and engage in spiritual renewal as preparation for Easter.

To assist in that spiritual renewal, the Church makes noticeable changes in its worship. The "Alleluia" (Hebrew for "Praise the Lord") and the Hymn of Praise ("Glory to God," "This is the Feast") are removed from the liturgy. All hymns and songs become more reflective in nature. The paraments and banners are darker in color. Crosses and crucifixes are covered with veils to emphasize how sin separates us from God. Everything turns inward until the victorious Resurrection when the colors brighten, the veils are removed, and the Alleluias and praises break forth in joyous celebration.

Lent is 40 days long, counting from Ash Wednesday (and minus the six Sundays, which are little celebrations of the resurrection). Those 40 days identify with Jesus' 40 days of fasting and prayer in the wilderness as he prepared for his ministry; with Moses' 40 days of fasting and prayer on Mt. Sinai as he waited to receive the Law from God; and with Elijah's 40 days of fasting and prayer on his way to Mt. Horeb, the mountain of God.

The Discipline of Lent

On Ash Wednesday, as Lent begins, we are invited "to struggle against everything that leads us away from love of God and neighbor" by exercising the Discipline of Lent: repentance, fasting, prayer and works of love. These become the specific occasions and opportunities for spiritual renewal during this season of renewal.

Living out a discipline takes our Lord's words about self-denial seriously (Matt.16:24). Through discipline, we find freedom and grace, just as parental discipline is loving and brings a child to freedom and righteousness (Heb.12:3-13).

In the Lenten Discipline, we focus our lives on Christ's self-sacrificing passion, death and resurrection, which has brought us acceptance, forgiveness and redemption by God. Through that same discipline, we make a loving response to God.

Repentance

Repentance means turning 180 degrees away from sin to walk toward God. Repentance includes an examination of our lives and our actions in light of God's grace and love, which comes to us free and undeserved through Christ's death and resurrection.

St. Paul tells us that we have been joined to Christ's death and resurrection through our dying to sin and rising to new life in Baptism (**Rom.6:3-4**). Repentance therefore also means returning to our Baptism, that occasion when we were washed of sin, joined to God in Christ and received the Holy Spirit.

Prayer

Prayer may generally be described as that activity in which we are drawn closer to God in contemplation and communication. Prayer is our half of a conversation with God. That means that prayer is not only speaking, but listening as well.

Prayer finds its anchor and focus in the Sunday Eucharist with the community of faith -- that Holy Supper in which we take God into ourselves by eating the Body and Blood of Christ. All prayer during the week springs forth from that union on Sunday and eagerly anticipates our Communion on the next Sunday.

It helps to have a consistent time and a quiet place for prayer, although prayer can happen anytime and anywhere. A cross or crucifix and a lighted candle can help create your place for prayer. For devotional aids or spiritual direction during the season of Lent, make an appointment with the pastor.

Fasting & Abstinence

Fasting comes to us from Judaism and was recommended by Jesus both in example and teaching (Luke 4:2, Matt.6:16-18, Mark 2:20). It is a practice that is designed to strengthen the spiritual life by weakening one's attractions to pleasures of the senses. Thus fasting is always coupled with prayer and spiritual preparation.

Since ancient times, the entire season of Lent has been marked by fasting and abstinence. Fridays in particular have been a special day of fasting because of it being the day of Christ's death. Fasting does not necessarily mean giving up all food for a day. More frequently it is the giving up or limiting of a particular food or food group (sweets, desserts, chocolate, butter, fat, eggs, etc.). Water is never given up in a fast. In addition, children under 16, people over 65, those who are ill or on medication, pregnant women, and travelers have traditionally been excused from fasting. Abstinence from some activity (such as television, movies, entertainment, etc.) on certain days, at certain hours or throughout the season is another way to observe the Lenten fast. This is designed to give more time for prayer and spiritual work.

Works of Love

The intention of this part of the Lenten Discipline is to connect our faith in God's love for us with actions that are loving of others in the world. **"God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life" (John 3:16).** Love is why Christ came. Love is why Christ died. Love is why God raised him from the dead. Love is the whole purpose and mission of the Church and of every Christian member: to show God's love in the world.

Beginning Your Discipline

As with all things, begin with prayer, asking the Holy Spirit for guidance in choosing those things that would best fit you for your Lenten Discipline. Prayerfully dedicate all your choices to God as a commitment for the six weeks of Lent, and ask that your Lenten Discipline move you closer to God for the sake of the sufferings and death of our Savior, Jesus Christ.

Gleanings from Break Forth Canada Conference

I would like to briefly share with you some information, encouragements, and blessings received at the Break Forth Conference which had 8000 people in attendance at the main sessions and a total of 15 000 over the weekend.

It was so encouraging to learn how God is manifesting Himself in various ways throughout the world and that many people are receiving Christ as their Savior. In Joel Rosenberg's sessions he explained the situation in the Middle East, related much of what is happening there, and shared how Bible prophecy is being fulfilled. I rejoiced as I learned that so many Muslims are turning to Christ for their salvation. Although their lives are in danger when they become Christians they are willing to go through suffering persecution or even death for their faith in Jesus. When they gather together for worship they must do so in secret. The greatest revival that is taking place amongst the Muslims is in Iran. A pastor from the States who travels to Iran for ministry enthusiastically shared with us many interesting stories and told of miraculous experiences that gave us insight into the power of God at work in this country. In spite of the danger this pastor faces, it was evident that his deep love and concern for the people motivates him to continue to share the good news of the gospel there.

Hans Weibrocht, a pastor from Sweden, in his session shared with us that revival is happening in Sweden in answer to prayer. He said that he had many doubts before the revival broke out that this could happen in his country that seems to be so far from God. As he said this I was reminded how so often as Christians our lack of faith also has a tendency to limit our Almighty God with whom all things are possible. Finland is also experiencing a revival and when Arlen and Elsa go there each year for a Break Forth Conference, Sweden and other surrounding countries gather with them for a time of ministry. Dick Eastman has written a book entitled, "Look What God is Doing." At the conference we heard of some of the phenomenal things God is doing in our world today from several presenters.

Many of you may be familiar with the well known authors Frank Peretti, Anne Graham Lotz, Paul Young, Lee Strobel, and Dr. Grant Mullen who were speakers at the conference. Each of them presented very challenging messages to be put into practice in our lives. Here are just a few amongst the many thoughts they shared that as Christians we need constant reminders: 1) Always live with total forgiveness towards God and others 2) Be assured that in every difficult circumstance in life God is with us, loving us, and refining us 3) Always remember that we are to be salt and light, using every opportunity to bear witness to our faith in Christ 4) Follow Christ's example in the way He ministered when He was on the earth.

There is so much more that I could share but it can not compare with being at the conference that is undergirded with prayer and the Holy Spirit is ministering through the power of the Word, teaching, sharing and worship. It can be life changing. One year at the conference a lady sensed the call of God to be in service for her Lord and is now involved in a world wide ministry. In responding to the seed that was planted in her heart she is now being used by God to reap a harvest in God's Kingdom.

Having been involved in various ways and especially through prayer from the beginning of New Creation Ministries in 1977 to its change of name to Break Forth Ministries and continuing to the present time I stand in awe as I hear how God has been using this ministry as an instrument in His hands. He has turned people from darkness to light through faith in Christ, healed the broken hearted, physically healed people, renewed lives, restored relationships, saved marriages, equipped God's people for ministry, and so much more. **To God be the glory! Great things He has done and is doing!**

We are looking for a design for a sign for our center circle that we drive around every Sunday. There are a few things we would like to see incorporated into the design: there should be a place for our cornerstones, new and old, our name, and lighting. Pick up your pencils and draw.

Where should my tithe come from?

Should I tithe from my take-home pay or my gross income?

Gross. Consider this question: Who deserves the first and best part of our income? The federal and provincial governments, or the living God? (The answer is clear; see Proverbs 3:9.) In Canada, the government takes taxes off the top, but Christians should nevertheless choose to give God the first and best portion. We should not allow the tax structure to keep us from giving generously to the Lord. Perhaps the best way to settle this question is to reflect on the gospel itself. The Lord Jesus made himself poor to the point of death in order to make us unimaginably rich (2 Corinthians 8:9). In light of this truth, even a tithe from gross income seems small. If we fear that we simply cannot afford a tithe from gross income, the Lord promises to provide all our needs when we give in faith (2 Corinthians 9:8).

Should I tithe from my income or my net worth?

Both. More precisely, we should tithe (and more) from income, and give over and above this from net worth. After all, the whole pile belongs to the Lord. In a sense, the distinction between income and net worth is artificial, because God has put all of it in our hands to see what we will do with it. We often find ways to give God the obligatory “tip” while at the same time hanging onto all we can. But to do this is to miss the point. All our wealth belongs to him. And what is more, he has saved us from judgment by the death and resurrection of Jesus. In light of these things, the answer is clear. The best biblical example of this pattern is King David (1 Chronicles 29:3), who recognized God’s authority and experienced God’s salvation. Therefore, when the time came to give to the Lord, he emptied his personal accounts as well as his official budget. We might think of the income tithe as “training wheels” to get us to the point of giving from all our assets.

Tithes and offerings are both tax deductible. The government has set up a structure that will allow us to give to the church (and other registered charities) and claim that amount in the year it is given or carried forward up to 5 years. The maximum amount is 75% of net income and the tax credit is 15% for the first \$200. Above that the credit is almost double at 29%. This works out to about half of the donation will be refunded to higher taxed individuals. Just think, you can give \$10,000 to the church and the government will credit you with \$5,000. There are even greater tax savings for those that would like to donate flow-through investments or stocks like those from bank or insurance companies that may have capital gains involved when they are sold. A professional adviser can run samples to help you plan your annual gift to the church. Also remember that a pledged amount is easier to follow through with when it is transferred to the church monthly by auto debit.

As we get close to tax time, you may want to review your giving for 2010. If you have questions about tithing or how you can support Bethlehem Lutheran further, contact Kelly Hogan or others from the church council. Thank You for continuing to support our church.

Dear Friends and Family,

It has taken a lot of time it seems for my emotions, or should I say heart, to catch up to all that we have been through since the day after Christmas. Not to say I have not felt emotions, but they have perhaps been different than what may have been expected, considering all the miracles the Lord orchestrated to save my health and life. At first, even while the heart attack was going on and for some days after I was frustrated, even angry. For starters, our hike was interrupted; then I was forced to leave home and the long-anticipated winter holiday with our kids who were here with us. There was the worry about my health; would I be semi-invalid for the rest of my life? There was the question about the future of our work in Lal and what of our three co-workers left there. So when a dear friend wrote after hearing of all the miracles the Lord had done and the successful stent implant, "You must be basking in the love of God," I was not there yet. I was still grieving and saying, "Why did the heart attack have to happen at all?" While in my mind I deeply appreciated God's tender care all the way through, there is a grieving that goes with this kind of event, and my emotions had not been able to keep up.

After the stent implant on December 28, I was released from the hospital on New Year's Eve. We stayed in a guest house in Sharjah (a city neighboring Dubai) along with our three visiting children for two weeks. On the sixth of January the cardiologist gave me a check-up and cleared me to travel back to Kabul. January 14 we returned to Kabul where we stayed and primarily rested until my six week check-up and stress test in Kabul on February 8. After doing an echocardiogram the doctor said "No one would know you have ever had any heart problems," Then he gave me a fairly aggressive stress test. As he looked at the results he said "Everything is absolutely normal". That was the clearance we needed to return to Lal and gradually get back to work. So we returned home on February 10, almost a week ago now, and I am feeling great!

On Friday as our little team gathered for worship I could feel my emotions catching up. The goodness of God was overwhelming. We sang "All the way my Saviour leads me". I choked up on the second line, "Can I doubt His tender mercy, who thro life has been my guide?"

In some ways I feel like a brat! It is easier now that I am restored to health to praise and be thankful, but I also know deep within that "Jesus doeth all things well." Whatever He chooses for His children is good; it is the best for us. I cannot doubt His tender mercy!

It is great to be back in Lal. We had some concern about the altitude (2800 m) but that has not been a problem at all. I am gradually increasing walking time every few days. I am up to 45 minutes today. There is a lot of work now to catch up on.

A new challenge has come up that has also been a blessing. On Wednesday, the day we arrived, a man came with some friends to our house with the request that I drive his father back to his village on the snowmobile. His father has a heart condition that is not treatable here in Afghanistan and basically was released from the clinic to return home and die. Since he was admitted there has been about 50 cm of snow and the roads are blocked even for horses and donkeys, so the man and his son had no way to return to their village 22 km away. We consulted as a team and thought that we should not do it, as it seemed a bit early for me to be back on the snowmobile, and I am the only one with enough experience driving pulling a sled behind. I related this to the man. He was devastated and so was I. How could I refuse his request when I had just been medically evacuated to a different country for treatment that restored my health at a cost of tens of thousands of dollars—all fully covered by health insurance—a privilege most people in the world don't have? When I had experienced the love and grace of God through the hands and prayers of a multitude of people? We discussed it again as a team and decided that I should go but take a co-worker along to do any heavy lifting if we bogged down in the snow. The trip went well. Yesterday another request came from a man from the same village whose wife seems to be terminally ill. Again we discussed and decided to take her home too. It was easier the second time as the trail from the first trip was there. Again I rejoiced at restored health, drank in the beauty of the snow-covered mountains, and delighted in the drive. I love that snowmobile and had been worried I would not be able to drive it for a long time. But it has been no problem!

I want to say a huge thank you to all of you who prayed, wrote to us, and helped in so many ways through this whole time. God has answered your prayers and I am humbled to tears again as I think on and feel His goodness.

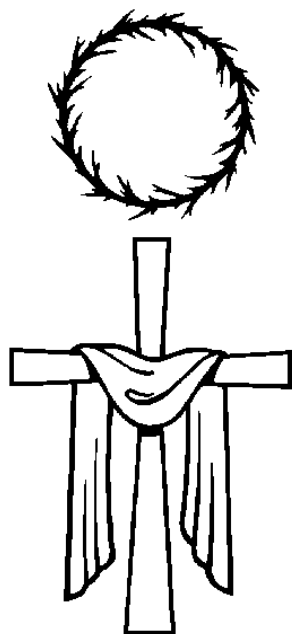

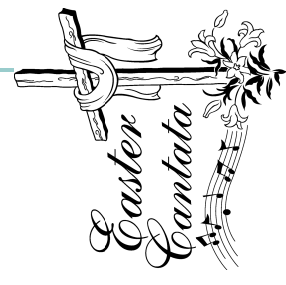
